TAKING A BREAK

As 2015 approaches its close (yes—only 86 days until Christmas), the club's major events will be complete until spring. We thank anyone who contributed to the "Boots for Backstoppers" campaign at the Lions BBQ and enjoyed some BBQ, and especially those who toiled many hours cooking, serving and cleaning up.

For those new members who may not be familiar with our club, we were chartered in 1925. Since then, the Lions Club of Webster Groves has contributed more \$3 million to worthwhile needs including: aid to the blind, college scholarships, assistance to the needy and support of youth athletic teams.

A brief summary by decade:

1920's: The first Lions carnival was held in August 1926. The 90th consecutive Lions carnival was held this year, 2015.

1930's: Webster Groves Lions financed and supervised construction of Webster Groves municipal tennis courts and baseball fields.

1940's: Webster Lions began hosting a luncheon for Webster High football team, coaches, and cheerleaders before the annual Turkey Day game; a tradition that continues today.

1950's: Webster Lions financed and supervised the construction of a permanent Wading Pool at the Municipal Pool in Memorial Park.

1960's: Webster Lions switched their carnival from late summer/early fall to the 4th of July in support of the Webster Groves Community Days.

An annual WGHS College Scholarship program was begun in 1964 to benefit deserving high school graduates. This program continues today with over \$300,000 in scholarships awarded.

1970's: The Lions were major contributors to the relocation of the Hawken House from Big Bend to its present location in Southwest Park.

The Lions also made substantial improvements to Moss Field including lights, scoreboard, and sprinklers.

1980's: WG Lions were major contributors to the construction of the Webster Groves History Center, popularly called the "The Barn".

1990's: Webster Lions spent more than \$20,000 and hundreds of man-hours of labor to install commercial grade electrical wiring in Memorial Field for the safety and benefit of the annual July 4th carnival goers.

2000's: Webster Lions welcomed the new millennia by contributing more than \$30,000 to the improvements to the Andy High ball field at the Lions Club Athletic fields in Webster's Memorial Park.

2010's: Webster Lions go into their second decade of 7 monthly Bar B Q's at 8400 Watson Rd. held the second weekend of every month March thru October except July when we have our annual carnival, because of these Bar B Q's, Lions are able to increase donations to Community and Scholarships. Also during this decade Webster Groves Lions Donated \$36,000 to L.C.I.F. Sight First (Lions Clubs International Foundation's) Fund the efforts of Lions nongovernmental organizations, and others to fight the major causes of preventable and reversible blindness, and other major disasters around the world. L.C.I.F. Donates over \$30 mil annually thru out the world.

Just imagine if every Lion, 1.4 million, asked one person to join their club...

SMOKE DETECTORS

Having smoke detectors in your home should be a no-brainer. After all, the consequences of not getting your family out of your burning home in time is pretty obvious, and smoke detectors are fairly inexpensive, readily available, and easy to install.

Smoke Detector Statistics

The importance of smoke detectors make the results of a 2008 phone survey easy to understand. It found that 96% of households in the United States reported that they had at least one smoke detector. Unfortunately, the results of that smoke detector survey isn't corroborated by the fact that smoke detectors aren't found in just over 30% of home fires.

More smoke detector statistics:

- About two-thirds of the deaths in home fires are in homes that either didn't have a smoke detector (40%) or didn't have a working smoke detector (23%).
- Many people don't know that they should replace their smoke detector every seven to ten years.
- Most smoke detectors don't work because the smoke detector battery is dead or has been removed or disconnected.

Smoke Detector Tips

To keep your family safe, you should:

- Install a smoke detector in every bedroom of your home and in the hall that leads to one or two bedrooms, and make sure there is at least one on each floor of your home, even in your basement.
- Choose a hard-wired smoke detector that has a battery backup, so that it will work even if the power goes out. Hard-wired smoke detectors are reported to be more reliable in fires than those that are powered by batteries alone.
- Get a smoke detector that has strobe lights that flash and/or vibrates if there is someone with hearing loss in your home.
- Be sure your smoke detectors are installed properly, according to the local code. Choose a combination or dual photoelectric and ionization smoke detector, since each type responds best to different types of fires, or install each type of smoke detector in your home and interconnect them. In general, ionization smoke detectors are best for detecting flaming fires, while photoelectric smoke detectors are best for detecting smoldering fires.
- Replace your [smoke detector batteries](#) at least once a year
- Test your smoke detector each month and replace it if it doesn't work or if it is already 8 to 10 years old.

Since your smoke detectors are simply early warning signals of a fire in your home, to be safe you also need a good home [fire escape plan](#) so that you can take advantage of that early warning and extra time and quickly get your family out of your home.

Perfect Attendance

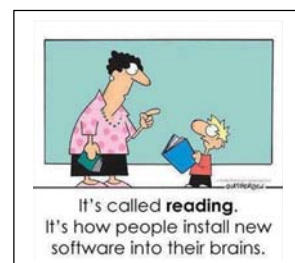
In order to receive a perfect attendance pin, you must attend all 26 meetings. If you miss a meeting you can make it up by working a function within a two week time frame.

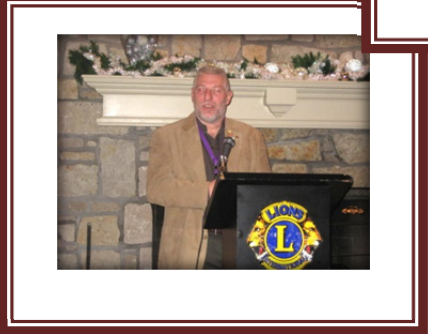
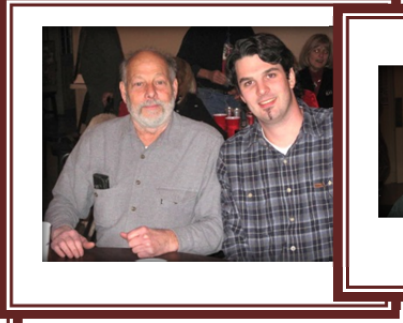

Imponderables

How Do They Keep All the Raisins in Cereal Boxes from Falling to the Bottom?

The Rule of Popcorn Physics, which states that un-popped popcorn kernels fall to the bottom of the bowl, has saved many a tooth for generations. The explanation for this immutable law is easy enough to comprehend: un-popped kernels fall to the bottom both because their density is greater than expanded popcorn and because our handling of the corn creates crevices for the un-popped kernel to slide down.

Many inquisitive types have searched for corollaries to the Popcorn Physics rule. For example, the tenet of Slithery Sundaes posits that regardless of how much syrup or toppings one puts atop ice cream in a sundae, it will all fall to the bottom of the bowl anyway, collecting in a pool of glop.

So it was not without a feeling of reverence and awe that we approached the subject of raisins in cereal boxes, tiny dried grapes that seem to defy the usual laws of food gravity. Linda E. Belisle, at General Mills, supplied the simple but elegant solution.

Raisins are added to boxes only after more than half of the cereal has already been packed. The cereal thus has a chance to settle and condense. During average shipping conditions, boxes get jostled a bit (the equivalent of our stirring the contents of a popcorn bowl while grabbing a fistful), so the raisins actually sift and become evenly distributed throughout the box.

The tendency of cereal to condense within the package is responsible for the warning on most cereal packages that the contents are measured by weight rather than volume. Little did you know that this condensation was also responsible for the Law of Rising Raisins.

Historical Tidbit

"The Star-Spangled Banner" is the national anthem of the United States of America. The lyrics come from "Defence of Fort McHenry", a poem written in 1814 by Francis Scott Key.

The poem was set to the tune of a popular British song written by John Stafford Smith for the Anacreontic Society, a men's social club in London. "To Anacreon in Heaven". Set to Key's poem and renamed "The Star-Spangled Banner", it would soon become a well-known American patriotic song.

"The Star-Spangled Banner" was recognized for official use by the United States Navy in 1889, and by U.S. President Woodrow Wilson in 1916, and was made the national anthem by a congressional resolution on March 3, 1931, which was signed by President Herbert Hoover.

Homemade Mayo:

From the kitchen of Lion John Schink

Tired of runny store bought mayo where the primary ingredient is water?

Try this:

- 1 large egg straight from fridge
- 2-3 tsp of lemon juice or juice from half of a lemon
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 1 cup extra light olive oil. DO NOT USE REGULAR OLIVE OIL

You can add other ingredients to taste such as a tablespoon of Dijon mustard, clove of garlic, or freshly ground black pepper.

You need an immersion blender and a tall glass jar barely wide enough to accommodate the blender head. ((one pint wide mouth mason jar)

1. Add all the ingredients to the container and let set just long enough to let the egg settle at the bottom.
2. Push immersion blender all the way down, making contact with the bottom of the container.
3. Turn blender on but do not move for a full 20 seconds.
4. After 20 seconds GRADUALLY start moving the blender up, down and around to make sure the oil gets well incorporated.

This mix will store in refrigerator for 2 to 3 weeks in an air tight container.
