Secretarial Duties

Initially, the job of Secretary for the Lions Club seems easy enough, with the following basic responsibilities:

Record minutes all meetings [stay alert - caffeine is okay, but not illegal drugs].

Keep record of who attends the meetings

[members only - not pets], and record it in the attendance spreadsheet [riveting fun]. Collect and note payment of attendees who eat dinner [anyone who doesn't pay will have their intestines ripped out]. Type Board Meeting minutes and read them to the club members at the next Business meeting, and to the Board at their next Meeting [record names of members sleeping during this].

Are You Smarter Than Your Spam?

Newer, sophisticated junk emails elude filters to con you

With an estimated 400 billion messages every day, spam makes up the majority of <u>internet</u> email traffic. But because today's spam filters are so effective—blocking more than 99 percent of junk messages—few actually make it to your in-box.

So cybercriminals are changing tactics to steal your money and identity. Rather than blasting out tens of millions of identical pleas from Nigerian kings and sellers of cut-rate Viagra, they're moving to smaller batches of better crafted come-ons that claim to be from companies and people you know and trust. I'm talking about your bank, insurance company and medical provider—and people like your boss, family members and longtime friends.

How it works

Known as "artisanal" spam, these emails go to only a few thousand recipients, which gives them a leg up in making it to your in-box. "The more emails sent by a particular party, the better chance they are blocked by spam filters," explains John Wilson of cybersecurity firm Agari. "With artisanal spam there are fewer targets, but the likelihood of any one victim falling for it is much greater."

That's because recipients are carefully courted with personalized traps. Often the information comes from data breaches—hacks into corporate computer systems to steal customer lists. "People who went to a certain medical clinic, for instance, may get a bill with their names, account numbers and dates of treatment," Wilson says. "And that money goes to criminals' accounts."

In another variation, crooks use special software to collect <u>personal details</u> from LinkedIn and other social networking sites. Or they send you malware-infected links in emails that seem to come from Facebook friends. "Once you click that link," Wilson says, "every keystroke typed is sent to the criminal—including when you go to your online accounts and enter your name and password."

Here's how to Protect yourself


Don't be fooled by the name displayed as the sender. Inspect the address that the message came from—a long series of letters or words after ".com" suggests it was sent by a spammer.

Be suspicious of links. When legitimate companies offer to remedy problems, or ask to update information, the email typically doesn't include links; instead the companies direct you to their website.

Verify. If you get an email with a link along with a message from a friend saying "check this out," call to find out if they really sent it.

Parse the credit card number. Emails pretending to be from credit card companies often cite the beginning numbers of an account; legitimate messages more likely cite the last few numbers. Reason: Like phone numbers, many credit cards start with the same digits.

Perfect Attendance


In order to receive a perfect attendance pin, you must attend all 26 meetings. If you miss a meeting you can make it up by working a function within a two-week time frame.

Why Is an Unwanted or Useless Possession Called a White Elephant?

The quintessential *white elephant* has several qualities in common: It is large and unwieldy; it is expensive (or at least extravagant for its category); it is a gift; and it is a gift that can't be refused in the first place and then can't be returned or destroyed for some reason. (Otherwise, who would want to keep a white elephant around the house?)

All of these connotations stem from the original white elephants, a strain of albino (actually whitish-gray) pachyderms that were considered sacred by the Siamese. Any captured white elephant, became, by law, property of the emperor. Under no circumstances could white elephants be destroyed without royal permission.

Any monarch worth his salt is besieged by assorted hangers-on, and a Siamese emperor devised an ingenious method to punish particularly obnoxious courtiers. He bestowed upon them the gift of one of the sacred white elephants. Unsuspecting courtiers probably could think only about the good news: the tremendous honor they had received. Rather soon, however, they recognized the bad news: They were saddled with a literal and metaphorical white elephant. At least that awful vase that your boss brought you when you invited him over for dinner is an inanimate object, one that can be dragged out of the basement or a closet if he should by some miracle ever be re-invited back. But real elephants do annoying things like eating and defecating and running around and tearing down fences.

Recipients of the white elephants were not allowed to work the elephants. They couldn't even ride them. Only the emperor was allowed to ride the white elephant, and the recipient was always aware that he must keep the elephant on hand in case the emperor decided he felt like a trot.

But the recipients had a more pressing problem: They simply could not afford the upkeep of the elephant. So although the contemporary recipient of a white elephant is only emotionally scarred, the earliest victims were inevitably financial ruined.

Easter Punch

Ingredients

25 ounces gin, such as Plymouth

20 ounces Acacia Honey Syrup, recipe follows

15 ounces freshly squeezed lime juice

10 ounces velvet falernum

10 ounces freshly squeezed grapefruit juice

1 teaspoon ground nutmeg

Rock candy sticks, for garnish

Acacia Honey Syrup:

2 cups acacia honey

Directions

Mix together the gin, Acacia Honey Syrup, lime juice, velvet falernum, grapefruit juice and nutmeg in a punch bowl.



Total Time: 25 min Prep: 5 min Inactive: 15 min Cook: 5 min

Yield: 10 to 12 servings

Fill a teapot with ice and then add some of the punch; stir in the teapot for 15 seconds. Pour into teacups and serve with rock candy sticks. Repeat with the remaining punch.

Acacia Honey Syrup:

Combine the honey and 2 cups water in a small saucepan and bring just to a simmer, stirring, until the honey dissolves. Remove from the heat and let cool completely. Refrigerate, covered, up to 2 weeks. Yield: About 4 cups
