Meet Our New Officer Positions

On July 4, 2017, LCI issued a new Constituiton & ByLaws whichmust be adopted by Lions Clubs. While many of the changes have not been addressed yet, the ones involving the additional officer and board member positions were addressed during the nomination & voting process for officers for the upcoming fiscal year. These changes were accomodated by an ammendment to our Constiution and ByLaws.

In addition to the nine oficers we have previously had, LCI has added four additional positions and seats on the Board.

LCIF COORDINATOR - LION JOHN GREGORY

He/she communicates the mission and success of LCIF and its importance to Lions Clubs International, implements LCIF development strategies within the club and collaborates with LCIF district coordinator to promote LCIF in the local area to ensure alignment with district goals. This position also collaborates with the club service chairperson and the Global Action Team to support club initiatives

CLUB SERVICE CHAIRPERSON - LION TEDDI SPEELER He/She shall:

- (a) Serve as a key member of the club's Global Action Team as the club Service Chairperson.
- (b) Collaborate with the District Global Service Coordinator, club LCIF coordinator, district leaders, members of the club's service committee and others to develop and communicate annual service goals and action plans that address current community needs and align with the Lions Clubs International service framework and/or district service goals when relevant.
- (c) Lead the service committee to implement the club's service action plans in order to achieve the club's service goals.
- (d) Incorporate opportunities for local youth and Leos to engage in all aspects of service activities, including goal setting, implementation, project evaluation and reporting.
- (e) Report service activities to Lions Clubs International.
- (f) Serve as a club resource on current community needs by monitoring the service activities of other service clubs, developing community partnerships to expand service, and utilizing tools and resources offered by Lions Clubs International and Lions Clubs International Foundation.
- (g) Increase member satisfaction by encouraging participation and engagement in service projects.
- (h) Collaborate with the club membership chairperson and other club committees to promote membership opportunities to non-Lions during service projects.
- (i) Attend the district governor's advisory committee meeting of the zone in which this club is located when appropriate

<u>Mktq/Communications Chairperson - Lion Fred</u> Yoder

He/She shall:

- (a) Develop and implement annual communications plans for internal and external audiences, including club members, news media, supporters/sponsors and potential new members.
- (b) Publicize club activities, including service projects, fundraisers, donations, Lions Clubs International sponsored contests and other newsworthy accomplishments both internally and externally via the news media, social media, and other effective means.
- (c) Expand humanitarian initiatives, community involvement and membership initiatives through social media.
- (d) Provide communication tools to club members and to encourage all club members to participate in promoting the club's activities via social media, referral and other effective means of communication.
- (e) Assist the club president in communicating information from the district, multiple district and international headquarters with the club members.
- (f) Work closely with the club membership chairperson to target and reach out to new potential club members.
- (g) Attend the district governor's advisory committee meeting of the zone in which this club is located when appropriate. Participate in meetings held by the district marketing communications chairperson

MEMBERSHIP CHAIRPERSON - LION BECKY SPEELER

He/She shall:

- (a) Serve as a key member of the club's Global Action Team as the club Membership Chairperson.
- (b) Collaborate with the District Global Membership Coordinator, district leaders, members of the club's membership committee and others to develop annual membership goals and action plans to recruit new members and to increase membership satisfaction among current club members. Present the plan to the club's board of directors for approval and support.
- (c) Develop and lead a membership committee to help implement action plans to achieve the club's membership goals and to positively increase the member experience.
- (d) Collaborate with the club service chairperson as well as other club committees to promote membership opportunities.
- (e) Understand the different membership types and programs offered and promote membership programs to club members.
- (f) Ensure each new member is provided an effective membership orientation and is provided opportunities to be engaged in club activities that are meaningful to the new member.
- (g) Attend the district governor's advisory committee meeting of the zone in which this club is located when appropriate.
- (h) Participate in Global Membership Team meetings held by the district.

WG Lions Welfare has helped 10 people with eye glasses, exams and other vision related issues since April of 2016. Since Lion Mike started as Welfare Chair in April 2011, WG Lions club has helped 180 people with vision issues.

AND WHAT DO WE DO WITH CARNIVAL & BBQ EARNINGS (& OTHER DONATIONS)?

The Webster Groves Lions helps to support many charities and community causes. We are able to do this by the continued efforts by our members and volunteers in fund raisers. Among these charities and causes are:

Leader Dogs for the Blind

It started with "\$400 and a hatful of ideas." Donald P. Schuur Leader Dogs for the Blind would not exist today if not for Lions Clubs International. Beginning with the support of one club, Leader Dog is now supported by Lions Clubs from all over the world.

It all began in 1938, when Charles A. Nutting, Donald P. Schurr and S.A. Dodge led the Uptown Lions Club of Detroit in establishing a school to train guide dogs for people who are blind. Their motivation was Dr. Glenn Wheeler, a fellow Uptown Lion whose attempts to be accepted by another guide dog organization proved unsuccessful. The first clients were housed at the Park Avenue Hotel in Detroit and graduated in the fall of 1938. Three Detroit Lions Clubs held a contest among all Lions Clubs for a new name for their venture. Over 500 names were submitted from around the world. The winning name "Lions Leader" was submitted by the Lions Club of Coulterville, Illinois.

On April 4, 1939, Lions Leader Dog Foundation was incorporated as a Michigan nonprofit. In May 1939, the Foundation leased a small farm in Rochester Hills, Michigan to house their new venture. Fifty dollars per month rented a farmhouse for the clients and staff, a barn for the dogs and a garage. On October 8, 1939, the first class of the official Lions Leader Dog Foundation graduated. The cost to graduate a client/dog team was \$600.

Soon after incorporation, the Lions International Board of Directors requested that the word "Lions" be removed from the name because they had not sanctioned official support of the organization. So on June 15, 1940, the new name "Leader Dog League for the Blind" became official.

The remainder of the 1940s saw additional growth of the organization and increased involvement of local and nationwide Lions Clubs. Support came in the form of donations, identifying potential client and spreading the word of Leader Dog's work and mission.

The decade of the '50s welcomed the first Leader Dog week (Dec. 3-9, 1950) in Michigan as proclaimed by Governor G. Mennen Williams. Leader Dog received a new Executive Director in 1951, Harold "Pock" Pocklington. Pock had been on the Board of Trustees since 1948 after he first visited Leader Dog while a District Governor-Elect. He would stay at Leader Dog until his death in 1986. Leader Dog's global ties to the Lions began strengthening in 1953 when S.A. Dodge served as president of Lions International, bringing Leader Dog to the Lions at the highest possible level. Melvin Jones, founder of Lionism, gave Leader Dog his personal endorsement in 1958.

The 1960s brought continued growth at Leader Dog in terms of number of clients graduated, number of dogs trained and number of employees on staff. In 1963, Lions International President Jorge Bird of Puerto Rico became involved with Leader Dog when he brought a Spanish soldier, Francisco A. Garcia, who had been blinded by a shell explosion, to get a dog. Until this time, the Lions were unable to establish themselves in Spain because its leader General Franco opposed having international associations in the country. However, when Garcia returned to Spain he received much press and Franco became aware of him. When President Bird was finally able to get an audience with Franco, he provided approval for Lions to establish themselves in Spain. At this meeting, Franco recognized the Lions as the group that "gave the dog to someone in Barcelona." The association of Lions of Spain and Leader Dog continues to this day. On May 10, 1968, Leader Dog received permission to use the Lions emblem by Lions International, formalizing the deep connection between the two organizations. The Lions' sustained support of Leader Dog was celebrated in 1972 with the addition of a life-size Lion to the Downtown Rochester training facility. The 2,200 pound statue was installed by the Shelby Township Lions and was designed and constructed by Gan Jacobsen (who became a long-time Trustee of Leader Dog). During this decade, Pock, who was still serving as Executive Director of Leader Dog, was twice elected to the Lions International Board (1974-75, 1978-79).

Leader Dog is recognized as a "Best In America" Charity by the Independent Charities of America (ICA).

It is for us to pray not for tasks equal to our powers, but for powers equal to our tasks, to go forward with a great desire forever beating at the door of our hearts as we travel toward our distant goal.

Gluten Free Black Bean Brownies (Just for Lion Sharon)

Ingredients

1 (15.5 ounce) can black beans, rinsed and drained

2 tablespoons vegetable oil

1/4 cup cocoa powder

1 tablespoons salt

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

3/4 cup white sugar

1 teaspoon instant coffee or 1 cup string brewed coffee (optional)

1/2 cup milk chocolate chips (optional)

Instructions

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Lightly grease an 8x8 square baking dish.
- 2. Combine the black beans, eggs, oil, cocoa powder, salt, vanilla extract, sugar, and instant coffee 9or brewed coffee) in a blender; blend until smooth; pour the mixture into the prepared baking dish. Sprinkle the chocolate chips over the top of the mixture.
- 3. Bake in the preheated oven until the top is dry and the edges start to pull away from the sides of the pan, about 30 minutes.
