For the Affton FD, we had the Seattle Rapid Access Tool. The SEARAT is designed to gain access to specific types of doors and latches widely used in both commercial and residential properties. It sports a Shove Knife, Pry Bar, Hex Head Wrenches, Speed Square, Ruler, Gas Shut-Off Wrench, Window Breaker, Seatbelt Cutter, O2 Wrench, and Lanyard. It's the "MacGyver" of



pocket tools. This tool is designed to do all sorts of "help the fire dude or dudette do their fire fighting job in a nifty way" stuff. Google it. Maybe you'll want one of your own. Pictured describing the SEARAT to us, is Chief Fahs.



For the WGPD, Officer Jason Flanery received Emergency Response Bags. They are emergency kits stuffed with medical supplies for emergency use at Webster Groves Middle and High schools and will be in the possession of the school resource officer.
